LA RUE DES FEMMES INSTITUTE OF RELA-TIONAL HEALTH: HEALING HOMELESSNESS

First, let's define homelessness.

In Québec, as elsewhere, there is a fairly widespread definition of homelessness as a "situation" that is related to exclusion from housing, and this belief guides our policies on homelessness. As a result, there is a belief that homelessness can be ended through, for example, a "housing first" approach.

Another definition is that of La rue des Femmes, a new and unique definition that positions homelessness as a "state" of grave loss of relational health—the vital capacity to feel safe and to connect with oneself and others—caused by severe relational injuries related to post-traumatic stress. The idea is to welcome extremely wounded and broken people and offer them the care and resources they need to heal and return to a normal life. With the same principles of ethics and confidentiality as in our health system.

Homelessness, a health problem to be cured

Healing homelessness involves recognizing homelessness as a condition, i.e., acknowledging that homelessness is a health problem.

Homelessness stems from an inner turmoil related to post-traumatic stress disorder: to be in a state of homelessness is to be disconnected from oneself.

To heal homelessness, it takes safe and welcoming places, a relational approach, and workers trained in relational health who are caring, empathetic and patient. Because it takes time to heal.



A paradigm shift is needed

Anthropologist Margaret Mead said she believed history's first sign of civilization in an ancient culture was the discovery of a human femur that had been broken and then healed. This healed femur was evidence that a person took the time to accompany the injured person, to treat their injury, take them to a safe place and help them recover slowly. She concluded that helping someone through difficulty is where civilization started.

It is high time that people experiencing homelessness are humanized and that, in a civilized society, they be treated with dignity and as truly curable. Advances in neuroscience offer us more and more ways to heal.

It takes a society that is aware of traumas and their impact on everyone's life and relational health. It takes a society that loves and helps its neighbour.

It takes an institute of relational health... and we are working

"My encounter with La rue des Femmes was simply magical! I was strongly attracted by its unique approach of welcoming women empathetically, compassionately and kindly. It fit perfectly with my vision of connecting with extremely vulnerable women I order to help them. To heal them."

A patient person, she lets the women come to her: "I wait. I don't impose myself. I am there to accompany the women, not to question them! Sometimes it can take months for a woman to open up to me and when that happens, I am there for her. And the healing happens little by little."

It takes time for a strong bond of trust to be established. Binta understands and respects this.


